Public Comment	Community Member Scott Hogrefe expressed concern over the non-reelection of Middle College Teacher Alison Liberatone earlier in the year.
Correspondence	President Sarver reported receiving correspondence from California State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson for the final approval granted for the new buildings at Sequoia High School.
Report on Special Education and Effectiveness of Co-teaching in SUHSD	Director of Special Education Dr. Deborah Toups reported that 11 percent of SUHSD students are in Special Education. She presented data and described criteria for student eligibility and services. Dr. Toups reported the co-teaching model has been in place four years with dramatic improvement when students with disabilities are included in General Education classes. She reported on demographic data and noted an increased enrollment of 138 special education students. Director Toups reviewed Special Education revenue and expenditures in regard to district and site-level staffing.
	Sequoia District Teachers' Association (SDTA) President Edith Salvatore said that input had not been sought from co-teachers this year. She noted that co-teachers need time to work together, and obtaining funding this past year had been difficult.
	Trustee Du Bois said she was most interested in a specialized program for certificates and diplomas, and is concerned about the kids that slip through the cracks. Debbie Toups advised that 55 Transition Resources for Adult Community Education (TRACE) students were working on receiving a certificate as opposed to a diploma.
	In response to questions posed by Trustee Thomsen, Dr. Toups said there are more mentally-severe students across the state. Dr. Lianides advised that \$30,000 is budgeted for substitute teachers and release time during the year.
	Director Toups advised that there is an emphasis on a Universal Design for Learning, and a renowned doctor is training staff on this learning program.
	In response to questions posed by Trustee Jack, Deborah Toups advised at Woodside there are nine pairs of co-teachers and 60 students will benefit. The teachers are co-teaching, and the planning is done during a release period. A sign of success is fewer suspensions.

Superintendent Lianides noted that improved grade point averages is also a sign of success; more Special Education students in co-taught classes are getting a "C" grade or better.

Dr. Toups noted that she will send the Board members definitions of the Response to Intervention (RTI) and Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) models. She will also look at truancy rates.

In response to questions posed by Trustee Weiner, the Superintendent advised that the expenditure for "NPS/NPA" was for residential care for about 50 students, the cost of which has been now been placed upon the district. He asked if some students are miss-diagnosed and/or labeled as Special Ed when they could be Limited English Proficient (LEP). Dr. Toups said the district inherits LEP students, and it takes five to seven years for these students to speak the language. Dr. Lianides said the English Learner Task Force can look at the percentage of English Learners that have Individual Educational Plans (IEPs).

SDTA President Edith Salvatore said she is not encouraging release days, which costs more than paying a substitute teacher. Expenditure planning needs to be utilized by co-teaching pairs to ensure there is funding for every pair.

President Sarver noted the overall picture is trending toward great improvement. We are seeing the positive impact of co-teaching on the Special Education student, and there is no impact on the non-Special Education student in the areas of grades and behavior. If teachers receive more training on the Universal Design Model, we will need to accommodate LEP students.

Follow-up on Possible Transition from "At Large" Election Method to "By District" Election Method (NDC) which works with public entities on these issues. On May 19, 2016, the Board received a letter from the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) notifying the District if it failed to move to the "*By District*" method of elections MALDEF would file a lawsuit under the CA Voting Rights Act and seek to recover expert and attorneys' fees. Dr. Lianides said he had requested input for tonight's discussion by notifying parents, the media, and all staff. He noted that this item will be brought back for Board action on August 17, 2016.

SDTA President Edith Salvatore said SDTA members are very interested in moving Board elections to even years, which would increase voter turnout. With "*By District*" elections, families could more easily approach their elected officials.

Community Member Rich Ginn suggested including partner elementary district parents in the district's communications regarding "*By District*" elections. He noted that no matter how the districts are divided there are challenges. He suggested carving out a Latino region, and to then splitting the district's comprehensive high school site boundaries to avoid regional partiality.

President Sarver said Board members want to hear from the community; there are many sides to the decision whether to move to "*By District*" elections, and they want to consider alternatives as well. Phase One would be looking at how sub-districts would be drawn, and Phase Two would be the actual implementation timeline to develop a process and changing elections from odd to even years.

In response to questions posed by Trustee Weiner, Deputy County Counsel David Silberman advised that if the District moved to even-year Board elections, they could still be staggered with two members on the ballot the first even year and three members running for election the next even year. Attorney Silberman said having one "*At Large*" election and many "*By District*" elections would not comply with the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA). A district based on race is not permitted, but communities of culture or socio-economic interests can be considered. County Counsel advised the CVRA is not forgiving, and an "*At Large*" election system cannot be maintained. It would require a lawsuit to determine that; no public entity has defeated a CVRA lawsuit, and it would be risky and expensive.

	 Trustee Thomsen suggested meeting with community members, presenting tenets, and discussing principles. Trustee Du Bois suggested developing board policy expectations that members should represent the entire district; she noted it is difficult to find people who want to run for office. Trustee Thomsen agreed that norms for Board culture should be developed; he cautioned against "<i>by district</i>" lines being drawn around high school boundaries. Trustee Jack said she agreed with Trustee Du Bois that it is difficult to get people to run for office, especially in low income communities. President Sarver said the greatest challenge is that all Board members are representing every student and parent throughout the District. He suggested preliminary tenets and maps be prepared for community member discussions. Community Member Jay Siegel cautioned that community attitude politics is difficult. (<i>There was a short recess at 7:46 p.m.</i>)
Discussion of Expulsion Placement Practices	Superintendent Lianides reported that the District has been referring its expelled students to the San Mateo County Office of Education instructional program, Gateway Community Day School, and the costs have risen considerably over the last three years. This past year SUHSD sent less students to Gateway, yet the costs were \$1.1 million, and SMCOE is estimating next year's cost to be \$70,000 per student. County Superintendent of Schools Anne Campbell is exploring some alternatives to possibly cap the costs at \$45,000 per student. Dr. Lianides said he will work issues out with SMCOE because it is in the District's best interests to utilize Gateway in 2016-17. However, SUHSD may be Gateway's only client this fall, and the costs for less students could be \$1 million more than was paid last year.
	Trustee Du Bois said some students expelled are very at-risk, and she felt good about putting kids at Gateway because they received a lot of support there.
	Dr. Lianides advised there are short- and long- term issues to resolve. The District can re-direct monies and program for 2017-18, the immediate challenge is what to do this fall. The Board is asked if it approves spending \$1.27 million on Gateway in 2016-17; one potential solution would be to develop a program with <i>Live in Peace</i> . The Superintendent noted he is hoping to work out something with SMCOE to carry us through 2016-17.
	Trustee Thomsen said we want to ensure that these kids are well-served. It seems like conversations with SMCOE are critical to reduce the cost, and he had confidence that the issues would be resolved.
	Trustee Jack said we are having expulsion problems with good students and are sending them to Gateway. She noted it had been agreed to look at discipline policies; there are policy models, such as the San Diego Trauma Informed Discipline Policy.
	Trustee Weiner said there are no options when expelling students who are a danger and should not be on our campuses. He suggested looking at the discipline policy to ensure there are suitable alternatives in our District. Trustee Weiner suggested getting the best deal we can from Superintendent Campbell for 2016-17 and setting up an internal supportive discipline policy- structured arrangement.
	President Sarver said we are reaching a critical economic failure point with Gateway; we acknowledge the difficulty of implementing an in-house alternative in 2016-17, and the complexity in developing long-term solutions in-house targeted for the 2017-18 school year. There should be site visits to observe discipline practices. The Board needs to decide where these issues rank in priority.

	Trustee Weiner said he wanted to see the discipline policy and community day program planning decided together. He noted as program alternatives to expulsion are identified, services will be more intelligently refined.
	Dr. Lianides said it is really a question of practice, which does not have to be reflected in policy. Out of the 25 students expelled this year, we are probably discussing a Gateway-type program for about 10 students. In the long run, we need to build a small program in the district that can address the students that cannot be on a comprehensive high school campus. There are qualified district staff that can operate a program for 10 to 15 students.
	Trustee Jack expressed her support of utilizing Gateway next year to provide time to design a future program to be implemented in-house.
	Superintendent Lianides said he heard direction to not move quickly, to do our best with Gateway this coming year, and plan to provide a community day school program in 2017-18.
	Trustee Thomsen proposed that an MOU be written delineating the costs SMCOE will charge SUHSD for Gateway in 2016-17.
Discussion of Board Bylaw BB 9320, <i>Meetings & Notices</i>	Following discussion, edits were agreed upon on pages: BB 9320(b), paragraphs one, two, and three; and BB 9320(c), paragraphs six and seven.
	In response to Trustee Du Bois' suggestion to start Board meetings at 7:00 p.m. and to publish a calendar of board items for the entire school year, Trustee Jack suggested a compromise of beginning Closed Session at 5:00 p.m. and Public Session at 6:00 p.m. Trustee Weiner agreed to the proposed start time and suggested that the Board endeavor to end meetings no later than 10:00 p.m. Dr. Lianides said a calendar of board items for 2016-17 will be presented on August 17.
	Superintendent Lianides said the revised Board Bylaw BB 9320 would be brought back for approval.
	Sequoia District Teachers Association (SDTA) President Edith Salvatore said by starting meetings at 6:00 p.m. the Board would have more staff involved than at 7:00 p.m., and she would be happy if meetings ended at 10:00 p.m. She suggested that presentations should be limited to eight minutes, and the meetings should be more disciplined.

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	In response to questions posed by Trustee Weiner and President Sarver, Assistant Superintendent Navas advised that there is a designated reserve for new initiatives; in August staff will happily make adjustments for co-teaching planning time. We have budgeted \$1.1 million in 2016-17 for Gateway. Mr. Navas said he plans will present the 2016-17 budget in the "bubbles" format.
	On a motion by Trustee Du Bois, seconded by Trustee Jack, the Board of Trustees adopted the Proposed Budget as the Official Budget for 2016-17, as presented.
Approval of Budget for Teacher Effectiveness Grant	On a motion by Trustee Thomsen, seconded by Trustee Du Bois, the Board of Trustees approved the Budget for the Teacher Effectiveness Grant.
Approval of Construction Bid for Redwood High School Multi- Purpose & Classroom Building	Superintendent Lianides advised the low bid was the best staff could do, and it is anticipated that some costs can be recovered with the passage of a state facilities bond in November. At this time approximately \$1.9 million will need to be transferred from the "additional small campuses" budget for this project. In response to a question posed by Trustee Weiner, President Sarver said when the Measure "J" bond was approved eight years ago, the unexpended funds were utilized for additional projects at the sites.
	On a motion by Trustee Jack, seconded by Trustee Weiner, the Board of Trustees approved the Redwood High School Multi-Purpose Room and Classroom Building Project bid with Gonsalves & Stronck in the amount of \$17,783,000 (base bid and contingency) and Alternate 1 for Gymnasium Bleachers for \$41,000, for a total contract amount of \$17,824,000.
Adoption of Res. No. 1577, Requesting San Mateo County to Levy Taxes in Anticipation of the Issuance of Bonds	Assistant Superintendent Enrique Navas advised that this is the second series of bonds scheduled to be sold from the June 3, 2014, election. Resolution No. 1577 is being brought before the Board to formally request that, pursuant to Education Code Section 15252, the Board of Supervisors of the County adopts a tax rate and levies tax for the remaining bonds in an amount estimated at \$100 million.
	On a motion by Trustee Weiner, seconded by Trustee Thomsen, the Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 1577, to ensure that property taxes are levied during fiscal year 2016-17 for the payment of the Bonds. The Bonds are expected to be sold in December 2016. Voting "yes,"—Trustees Du Bois, Jack, Sarver, Thomsen, and Weiner; voting "no"—none, and absent—Student Trustee Hartzell.
